ost of the time they work backstage. However, without the Information and Communication Systems (ICS) specialists, no air operation – and therefore no exercise as important as the Tiger Meet – would be possible.

At the Tiger Village, about 80 shelters called "Modular Shelter of Command Station" have been settled this way. Equipped with 180 computers, they are the working environment of the flying crews.

A free-access internal network also allows the 17 participating nations to exchange information. Major William Nantier, chief of the ICS part of the exercise explains that "These facilities are necessary for the achievement of the exercise. Our task consists in connecting the detection and control deploying center or the ground-based air defense squadron to the operation command. We also work on the setting of the Liaison 16". In total, six months of preparation and installation were needed. A mission to which the technicians from Cambrai AFB highly contributed.

I realize how lucky I am to be able to experience such an outstanding event, while I only enrolled in the French Air Force a few months ago!"
